



The Great Discovery of Journey to the West

The wild boar was dead. But where was Granny Xiu? The children could not find her anywhere...






Big Feet Girl Written by Yan Xinyuan Illustrated by Wan Wan

She has been promoting reading for many years, in Taiwan, mainland China, Hong Kong, Singapore and Malaysia. Readers, both young and old, affectionately call her "The grandma who plants reading flower seeds".

Her books include, "Picture book reading era", "Creative play picture book", "Can you write?" "A fat stone", "I have a friendship to rent out", "When the crocodile meets the panda", "Mummy's heart, mummy's tree",

"Hush! It's a secret!" "Every day is a Wednesday", "Grandma lives in Perfume Village", "Would you like to have a star?" and so on. Her translations include "Tear thief", "Broken Bird", "The Perfect Prince" etc. - nearly two hundred books in all.

She has won the South Korean Yi Island International Book Award, the Shanghai Children's Book Award, the Laureate Award for Children's Books, The American Library Association Award (the Best Foreign Book Award), The Hong Jianquan Prize for children's Literature, The Poetry for Young Children Award, The Mandarin Daily News Reed Pipe Award and The United Daily News Best Children's Book of the Year Award. She is the Chairman of the Cross-straits Children's Literature Research Association, a member of the Editorial Board for Chinese Textbooks, a consultant for the HongKong Education Publishing House, a consultant for the First Normal College for Preschool Education Book Centre, and a judge for the first Shanghai International Children's Book Fair Windmill Award.



He Yixuan was born in 1986 and comes from Taipei. She graduated from the Department of Visual Arts at Chang Jung University. She is a full-time illustrator of children's books, she loves cats and is interested in many different things. Her hope is that through her creativity she can touch people's hearts and make this world a warmer place. The picture books that she has illustrated include, "To put by some grain for a rainy day", "Treasuring affection – friends who share the same heart are like soil transforming itself into gold" and so on.

Where books and roses meet(Fang Suzhen)

Every year on April 23rd the International Reading Day is held. So why is it held on this particular day? Most people are not aware of the reason. I found some information related to this topic and discovered that it was the birthday of the great English poet and playwright, William Shakespeare, and it is also his memorial day. The great Spanish writer, Cervantes, (the author of "Don Quixote") also died on this day.

In addition there is a legend that tells the story of the fire-breathing dragon, the princess and St. George. In the Catalonian region of Spain, on April 23rd, a memorial day is held to commemorate St. George slaying the dragon. On this same day every year, male and female students give books and roses to each other. Wide streets and small alleys are permeated with the smell of new books and fragrant flowers.

Based on these coincidences and legends, and also in order to respect authors and their works, on November 15th 1995, at the Paris Convention, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) established April 23rd as "World

Book and Copyright Day" and requested all nations to stress the importance of reading, publishing and the development of intellectual property rights.

And so from then on April 23rd became the international reading day, both romantic and intellectual in nature, for booklovers all over the world.

Shortlisted for 2013 The Astrid Lindgren Memorial Award



Yin Jian Ling, the author, was born in Shanghai in 1971. She studied French for her bachelor's degree and obtained her master's degree in Literature. In 1989 she published her first works, mainly in the form of literature for teenagers. She has been the chief editor of a women's magazine and is currently the chief editor of "The Xin Min Evening News." She is also member of the board of directors for the Shanghai Writers' Association and is a second tier national psychology consultant.

The covers a wide and varied range of subject matter in her works, and she has mastered many different styles. She has written "The Cardboard Girl", a work with exploratory significance for young teenagers, and she has also written a lively and much-appreciated series of stories for young children entitled "Kind-hearted Xiaomi". Other wellknown works of hers are "Cherry trees in the wind", "The year 1937 and teenager Xia Zhiqiu", "Boat to the Sky" and "The love between Grandma and Me". The media gave her the titles of "Soulmate for children and their parents" and "Guide for children growing up".
