In 2012, Nimbus Publishing was awarded the Retail Council of Canada Small Press Publisher of the Year Award.



It's 1930 and the airstrip in her hometown of Harbour Grace, Newfoundland, is a popular launching point for intrepid aviators. But how will Ginny's dream take flight when her mother so fiercely believes a woman's place is in the home?

At the height of the Great Depression, the Ross family certainly can't spare any money for flying lessons, and Ginny will need a mentor if she is ever going to make it out. Against all odds—but not without a few stumbles—Ginny Ross has made it to Purdue University in Lafayette, Indiana (the academic home of her friend and mentor, Amelia Earhart). For Ginny, this is the next step toward becoming a pilot, but as the only girl in her engineering program, she constantly has to prove herself.

When Amelia takes off in 1937 to fly around the globe, Ginny can't shake a feeling of foreboding. Then Amelia disappears without a trace, and Ginny must figure out if she has what it takes to



All she has left in the small town is her older brother, Sean, who is struggling to keep the lights on in their run-down family home. Charlotte hasn't spoken to her best friend, Sophie, since the night she fled. It's not exactly a celebratory homecoming.

On her first night home, Charlotte shows up unannounced to Sophie's eighteenth birthday party, and the trickle-down effects of that decision haunt Charlotte for weeks.
